To create awareness regarding tanks, a jatha on tanks and promising water for the community was taken up as it is one of the objectives of GMO. This it to improve the life of poor farmers and those with small landholdings, as well as to have quality food and water and it helps to maintain a good fertile soil

13. Bommasandra Village:

The objective of the programme taken up by GMO regarding the promise of water and tanks jatha to create awareness about the importance of tanks and water.

- They asked why can't the organisation directly help us

14. Reddahalli Village:

Experiences and problems faced during the COVID-19 Pandemic 2nd wave

1. About domestic violence:

A discussion was held with the Swallows team Vigilance Committee, CRC members and CDC Committee members regarding the lockdown and an approach-based report has been prepared as per their instructions. When we asked them whether any incidents of domestic violence against women and girls were reported in the villages during the lockdown and what suggestions and guidance they had proved, they informed that there were no such incidents in the village.

We asked them the reason for which they answered as follows: As the COVID-19

Pandemic 2nd wave is spreading even in the rural areas, as per the government orders, the MP and MLA, ASHA and anganwadi activists, local elected representatives, PDO and Panchayat members, police and other government officials made efforts to visit each and every house and create awareness among the villagers about the pandemic. The villagers also received ample information through the media, newspapers, and came to know about the latest developments. Ultimately, all of them were in such a mood that it will be great if they would just survive. Even people with alcohol habits couldn't get alcohol in the months of May and June. Due to the lockdown every member of the family including elders and children were locked inside their houses. May be this was also one of the reason for drunkards not able to consume alcohol. Most importantly atleast one death has been reported from every village due to the Coronavirus. Many people who died of the pandemic in cities were brought to the villages for cremation. All these things really created panic and fear among the villagers. Due to all the above mentioned matters it can be summed up that alcoholic habits have reduced a little, resulting in lesser violence against women and children.

The Government had also regulated sale of alcohol and wine shops during lockdown. They were allowed to sell alcohol only from 6.00 am to 9.00 am. As a result many of them were not getting alcohol. If at all they got it was not enough for them. Other things like increase in prices, financial problems, no labour, no wages also are some of the reasons for restrain in alcoholics. Many of them couldn't get even loan during the lockdown. Those who have alcohol habits in the villages had to go to towns and cities to get it, but there

was no transportation. Due to all these reasons 50% of the people with alcoholic habits couldn't peruse it.

Those who had received vaccination were strictly told not to consume alcohol, rumours were also doing rounds that if they drink they would die. Several things appeared in the media also contributed for this.

Usually incident of domestic violence occurs only when the men are drunk. If there is no alcohol such incidents will also not take place, which appears to be correct when we look at the situation.

2. Children's Education:

The children in our district are deprived of studies due to the lockdown. There was lot of chaos in the government department itself. They were unable to arrive at a suitable decision. The online education didn't work properly in rural areas mainly due to internet connection problem and lack of smart phones with the people. As a result many children were unable to get online education.

In rural areas there are atleast two children in almost every household. Looking at the plight of their children many parents provided smart phone with great difficulty. But in the name of online classes many children were found misusing the time. As a result of all this, the children either were not working or studying. Many children in our village have almost forgotten school and concept of studying. All of them are always found to be chatting and passing time. The screen time of children has increased a lot as a result of all this.

A few children have fallen prey to bad habits like consuming drugs. They may become completely unproductive and become anti social elements of the country. According to

many who are working in the social sector are of the feeling that the problem of child labour will increase in the near future. Though the effects of deprivation of education on children don't appear suddenly, it will definitely appear in the future. Many youth have already become unproductive and are wasting valuable time. It may also lead to criminal activities.

Promoting children without conducting exams may result in lesser knowledge among the children. It is almost impossible to change the children who have already spoilt from the last two years. The government may have to struggle for several decades in order to set right the health and education system.

Due to the lack of interest in the government, lack of concern among the elected representatives the educational sector has been hit strongly. After noticing that online education is impossible in rural areas especially, the academic year has been postponed to July 1. Whereas our MLA and Ministers are still engaged in distributing food kits and are busy preparing for the next elections.

In case if schools and colleges are not opened soon, problem of child labour, child marriages will increase definitely. The problem will be mightier than the COVID-19 Pandemic. The entire future generation may face lot of problems like no knowledge, poor mental condition, poverty and gap between rich and poor might widen. Also criminal activities will increase, along with other problems like malnutrition, beggar, stress, pressure, panic attacks among the youth.

Child Marriage:

No incidents of child marriages were found in any of the villages where SWALLOWS

program is implemented, as a result of the frequent visits by the government officials, due to lack of transport facilities, closure of temples, readymade clothes shops, jewellery shops, etc.

As a result of number of infections and deaths due to the pandemic many parents also have not been able to think of conducting weddings in their houses. Even under such circumstances one child marriage case was reported from the Vegamadugu village, which comes under the SWALLOWS program area. The incident came to light 3 days after the marriage was conducted. We thought that we

may not get the required cooperation from the villagers if we approach directly. Hence, we brought it to the notice of the District-level Federation and government officials concerned and case was registered. This has helped in creating awareness among not only the people of this village but also the surrounding villagers.

COVID-19 Pandemic

The number of COVID Positive patients in 20 villages was also very less as found during the survey. About 19 of them tested positive who were kept in home quarantine and treated. Luckily all of them have recovered.

- As I am in old age now I am scared that I may develop diseases so I haven't taken the vaccination
- As there is no vehicle to go the hospital to take the vaccination we still have not take it.
